# ARRESTS MADE IN MAY 2015

There were a total of **96** arrests made within the City of North College Hill in MAY 2015.

**59** of the arrests were recite arrests (the person arrested was not physically taken into custody but issued a citation and told to appear in court).

**37** of the arrests were physical arrests (the person was physically taken into custody).

Of the total arrests made within the month of MAY 2015, **56** were residents of North College Hill and **40** were non-residents.

## IN MAY 2015


There were a total of 40 auto accidents within the City of North College Hill in MAY 2015.

0 - of these crashes involved injuries.

28 - of the auto accidents were on public roadways.

8 - of the auto accidents were on private property.

4 - of the auto accidents were Hit/Skip related.



# TRAFFIC CITATIONS ISSUED

## IN MAY 2015

The North College Hill Mayor's Court had year-to-date receipts totaling \$70,444.00 as of MAY 2015.



There were a total of **134** traffic citations issued within the City of North College Hill in MAY 2015.

**42** of the citations were for moving offenses (OVI, Speeding, Fail to Obey a Stop Sign, etc.)

**19** of the citations were for non-moving offenses (Expired license plates, not wearing a seatbelt, etc.)

20 of the citations were for parking related offenses (Parked where prohibited by signs, etc.)

53 of the citations were written warnings (the person cited was not required to pay a fine or appear in court).



# VEHICLES TOWED OR IMPOUNDED

## IN MAY 2015

There were a total of 11 vehicles either towed or impounded within the City of North College Hill in MAY 2015. (These vehicles were towed or impounded at the request of the police department)



# FALSE ALARMS RECEIVED

## IN MAY 2015

There were a total of 47 false alarms received that required a response by the North College Hill Police Department in MAY 2015.

17 of these false alarms were to businesses.



30 of these false alarms were to residences.

183 Total false alarms have been received in 2015.



The following narratives are a small sampling of the various calls for service the North College Hill Police Department routinely receives.

## **CALLS FOR SERVICE**

### **Burglary (2911.12)**

On May 3rd 2015 at around 1755 hours, PO Elston was dispatched for a burglary in progress/just occurred. Upon arrival, PO's Elston and Wilber were met at the door by a 15 year old resident of the household. The complainant and her little brother were home at the time of the incident. She stated that the house was secure except the main front door. She told the officers that the screen/glass door was locked behind it however. She stated that she was upstairs doing some work when she heard some commotion downstairs. She said by the time she made her way downstairs she did



not find anyone. She did however; notice that a Toshiba laptop was missing from a coffee table by the front door. She also noticed that the Playstation 3 in the living room had been tampered with.

The complainant told the officers that she had already looked around the house for anybody hiding. Officers Wilber and Elston still searched the house and basement to ensure that nobody else was in the house. They did not find anybody else or signs of anything else being disturbed. Officers Elston and Wilber had everyone in the house wait on the front porch as we searched for some good fingerprints to lift. In their search on/near the front

screen door, they noticed the screen frame had been bent in order for someone to reach their hand through to activate the handle on the inside of the door. They found a set of prints on the outside and inside of the door frame. They also found a set on the Playstation 3.

As they were getting ready to leave the house, the complainant's mother noticed that the rent money was missing as well. She could not tell us exactly how much she thought was in it. She was advised to contact the police department with an exact amount and to inform them if she notices anything else missing or disturbed.

## **Misuse of a Credit Card** **(2913.21)**

PO Brown responded to see a complainant for a report of a theft of a credit card. The complainant advised that sometime between 05/04/15 at 1100 hrs. and 05/05/15 at 1100 hrs., person(s) unknown entered her bedroom and removed her MasterCard credit card without her permission. She advised that when she discovered it missing, she



immediately called the bank to close the account. The bank advised that there were a total of (4) charges made on that date, three charges of \$40 and one charge of \$60, somewhere downtown. PO Brown advised that she needs to obtain her statement as soon as possible, so the police can look into the theft.

## **Robbery (2911.02)**

On 05/09/2015 @ 1548 hours, officers were called to the parking lot of the United Dairy Farmers for a report of an auto theft that had just occurred. Upon arrival, police located the victim, who advised he was pumping gas in his vehicle when an unknown person came up to him and requested a ride to Indiana. He stated he told the unknown person that he was not going to Indiana and that he would not give the subject a ride.

The victim stated that the subject turned around and appeared to walk away. It was at that moment that the victim turned around to hang the gas pump back up and collect his receipt. While grabbing for his receipt, the victim heard his car door slam shut. He stated he saw the subject in the driver seat of his vehicle. The victim ran over and opened the driver side door of his vehicle, while the suspect began to drive away. The victim was

able to open his car door but he stated that the suspect began pushing his hand and arm away, in an effort to close the driver side door. He stated that he was only able to hold onto the door for a short time before the suspect was able to push his arm away, causing the victim to fall and hit the ground/roadway. It was reported that the victim had fallen onto the pavement, halfway between the parking lot of UDF and Hamilton Ave.


The victim sustained injuries during the incident and suffered a laceration and abrasion to his left arm/elbow and bruising to his shoulder. He declined to have EMS respond to the scene.

Police took the description of the suspect as a male white with a black shirt. Police had the Hamilton County Communications Center put out a broadcast for the vehicle description, the suspect information, and the possible destination of Harrison, West Harrison, or Indiana. The vehicle was entered into the police RCIC and NCIC, LEADS computers following the report from the scene. Officers then transported the victim to his residence located in Mt. Healthy.

Officers knew as they were responding to the incident, that the description that had been given pertaining to the suspect (a male

white, approximately 20 years old, and asking for a ride to Indiana), matched the description of a subject that had stopped by the police department approximately 20 minutes prior to this incident.

The subject that walked into the police department, had been arrested by North College Hill Police a few days ago and after being released from the HCJC on that date, he walked to the police department in an effort to retrieve his cell phone. While at the police department, the subject stated to PO Maus that he was trying to get home to Indiana and that he needed a ride and/or money. The subject asked PO Maus to give him a ride home and when PO Maus stated that he could not do that, the subject asked to borrow money from PO Maus so he could get home and he promised to pay PO Maus back. When he was advised by PO Maus that he did not have money to provide, he walked out of the police department angered and frustrated.



## **Criminal Damaging**

On 5/11/15 at approximately 2:05 AM, PO Smith received a public service from the complainant reporting damage to her property.

Upon arrival, he made contact with the complainant. The complainant stated that she heard a crashing sound in her house at approximately 2:00 AM on 5/11/15. The complainant then stated that she discovered damage to her bedroom window. Two small rocks were recovered near the window by the complainant. The complainant also filed a report for criminal damaging approximately two week ago for the same window, and believes that the damage is being caused by juveniles in a apartment complex that borders her residence.

At approximately 3:35 AM on 5/11/15, the complainant called and advised that she also discovered damage to her bathroom window. The complainant stated that she believes the damaged was caused by a pellet gun.

### **Criminal Damaging** **(2909.06)**

On 05/17/15, the complainant came to the station to report damage that had been done to her vehicle. She stated that sometime between 05/15/15 at 1445 hrs. and 05/16/15 at 1800 hrs., someone unknown had apparently fired a bullet into the front

left door of her vehicle. She stated that there were what she believed was gunshots and police activity around 1800 hrs. on 05/15/15, but did not go outside at that time. It is unknown if the damage to her vehicle was related to the activity in question.

### **Theft (2913.02)**

The victim responded to NCHPD to report a theft of her credit/bank card. According to the victim, she had the same card for several years and never used it. She then used the card to pay for dinner at Joe's Crab Shack. Over the next few days, she started receiving mobile alert, text messages from her bank. These text messages provide the cardholder information every time the card is used. The messages display the time, place, amount of money spent and are in use to "protect" against fraudulent activity. The victim noticed these messages while at work. Several messages showed up on her phone, notifying her purchases were being made from her card. She contacted the bank who advised an unknown party had actually called in and changed her password. Once notified, the bank put a hold on the account



which, blocks any further charges or damages. At the time of the report, a total of \$1040.28 had been charged to the victim's account. Apparently the charges were conducted at multiple locations in and around French, California. The victim stated the bank had requested a police report to further assist her.

## Trouble with Former Employee

PO Henn was dispatched for a subject that was allegedly assaulted by the manager of Save A Lot. Upon arrival, he located the complainant standing in front of the AutoZone, just across the parking lot from the Save A Lot. The complainant stated he is a former employee of Save A Lot, and had just been in an altercation with the manager. He stated he was assaulted by the manager, and was pushed. The complainant initially denied being injured, however he later stated that he was "mentally harmed" and because of the incident, he now has "low self-esteem" and feels bad about himself.



PO Henn was able to speak with the store manager, who stated the complainant was scheduled to work today, and did not arrive for work. The store has had problems in the past with the complainant not showing up for work, and after today's incident, the manager was going to terminate the complainant's employment. The manager stated the complainant came into the store today's date, and became belligerent with him. He was heard yelling, cursing, and slamming doors. He then left the store, only to return a few minutes later. He returned, again being belligerent with the manager, at which time the manager began to escort him from the store.

PO Henn was able to see store surveillance video that does show the complainant come into the store, and immediately walk to the management offices. He had a conversation with the meat department supervisor. He then walked further back into the offices and began what appears to be a heated conversation with the manager. The complainant then exited the store. He is seen returning, and engaging the manager again, at which time it appears the manager begins to escort the complainant from the store. At one

point, as the manager was escorting the complainant from the store, the complainant abruptly turns toward the manager and appears to approach him. The manager utilized an arm block, pushing the complainant back. The complainant then exited the store.

After viewing the video, and speaking with store employees, it was determined that the complainant appears to have been the aggressor in the incident. The manager declined to file criminal charges against the complainant; however he did wish a Criminal Trespass Notification be issued. That notification was issued, and the "complainant" was advised of the findings based on the store surveillance as well as statements from other store employees. He was then sent on his way and advised not to return to the Save A Lot store.

## **Felonious Assault** **(2903.11)**

On 05/28/2015 @ 1648 hours, officers were dispatched to the area of Betts Ave and Dallas Ave for a person shot. Initially, when officers arrived in the area of Betts



Ave and Dallas Ave, nothing appeared out of the ordinary and a victim was unable to be located.

While continuing to search the area, PO Cole was flagged down by a neighbor near the intersection listed above; who stated that they had discovered one shell casing in the intersection of Betts Ave and Dallas Ave. PO Cole took a picture of the intersection in question and another picture of the shell casing. The shell casing was collected as evidence and will be submitted to the lab for processing.

While officers were investigating the scene, the dispatcher advised officers that they had just received a phone call from a victim, who was advising them that he had just been shot in the hip while he was walking on Betts Ave. He initially advised dispatch that he was at a house Goodman Ave but when officers responded to that address, there was no answer.

Officers requested that dispatch call the victim back to verify his exact location and it was determined that he was currently walking towards the Goodman Ave address and that he was just down the street.

PO Cole advised that he had located

the victim at the intersection of Goodman Ave and Bake Ave. The victim had a visible wound/injury from an apparent gunshot to his left hip. It appeared the bullet grazed his hip and there was no visible entrance or exit hole in his hip.

The victim stated he was walking north on Betts Ave @ Dallas Ave with some friends when a dark blue colored SUV (possibly a Chevrolet brand) with chrome wheels, also traveling north bound on Betts Ave, approached the victim and his friends from behind. As the vehicle got closer, one of the occupants fired one single gunshot from the vehicle, which grazed the left hip of the victim. The vehicle was reported to be occupied by four male blacks and after discharging the gunshot, the vehicle fled the scene in an unknown direction.

NCH EMS was requested to respond to our location to evaluate the victim's injury and it was then subsequently decided that he should be transported to University Hospital as a precaution. The injury the victim sustained is believed to be non-life threatening and a full recovery is expected. A report was generated for

documentation purposes and the investigation is still ongoing.

## **Criminal Damaging** **(2909.06)**

The complainant advised that another window of his house has been broken. The house is currently vacant and he is rehabbing the house to rent or sell. According to the complainant, a neighbor told him the kids next door, along with some other neighborhood kids continually play kickball, hardball, football and other sports in the yard between the houses and have broken windows in the past. They also have reportedly caused damage to neighbor's vehicles and other property as well. The complainant had already planned on putting in new windows in the house, but he is now concerned the new windows will be broken in the future. He was advised a report would be generated and kept on file at the North College Hill PD.
