# ARRESTS MADE IN MARCH 2017

There were a total of 71 arrests made within the City of North College Hill in MARCH 2017.

48 of the arrests were recite arrests (the person arrested was not physically taken into custody but issued a citation and told to appear in court).

25 of the arrests were physical arrests (the person was physically taken into custody).

Of the total arrests made within the month of MARCH 2017, 18 were residents of North College Hill and 53 were non-residents.

# VEHICLE CRASHES REPORTED IN MARCH 2017


There were a total of 27 auto accidents within the City of North College Hill in MARCH 2017.

6 - of these crashes involved injuries.

26 - of the auto accidents were on public roadways.

1 - of the auto accidents were on private property.

2 - of the auto accidents were Hit/Skip related.



# TRAFFIC CITATIONS ISSUED

## IN MARCH 2017

The North College Hill Mayor's Court had year-to-date receipts totaling \$34,579.16 as of MARCH 2017.



There were a total of 136 traffic citations issued within the City of North College Hill in MARCH 2017.

63 of the citations were for moving offenses (OVI, Speeding, Fail to Obey a Stop Sign, etc.)

10 of the citations were for non-moving offenses (Expired license plates, not wearing a seatbelt, etc.)

17 of the citations were for parking related offenses (Parked where prohibited by signs, etc.)

46 of the citations were written warnings (the person cited was not required to pay a fine or appear in court).



# VEHICLES TOWED OR IMPOUNDED IN MARCH 2017

There were a total of 17 vehicles either towed or impounded within the City of North College Hill in MARCH 2017. (These vehicles were towed or impounded at the request of the police department)



# FALSE ALARMS RECEIVED

## IN MARCH 2017

There were a total of 23 false alarms received that required a response by the North College Hill Police Department in MARCH 2017.

7 of these false alarms were to businesses.



16 of these false alarms were to residences.

71 Total false alarms have been received in 2017.



The following narratives are a small sampling of the various calls for service the North College Hill Police Department routinely receives.

## **CALLS FOR SERVICE**

### **Theft (2913.02)**

The complainant was shopping at the Kroger store, and checking out at the U Scan lanes. Once she was done scanning her items, she went to retrieve her wallet / cell phone case to pay for her items, and she found that it was missing. She cancelled her grocery order and went to the customer service desk to see if anyone turned her wallet / cell phone & case. Nothing was turned in. Management assisted her and looked at the cameras where she checked out. As they watched the footage, they observed that her cell phone / wallet case fell onto the



floor with her not knowing it.

After it fell onto the floor, they observed 2 female blacks and a male black at the register behind the complainant. Moments after the case fell to the floor; the male black walked over and picked the item off of the floor. He was then seen walking behind the two females while placing the item in his left front pants pocket. The subjects are unidentifiable on the cameras and left the store soon after the male picked the item up off of the floor.

The complainant was advised that she should contact her bank, in which she advised she did prior to my arrival, contact the

Social Security Administration to advise that her SSN card was stolen and to contact her cell provider to shut the phone down. She said that she would and would also be in tomorrow to get a copy of the report.

identification and one produced his identification and the other provided his name and date of birth.

After obtaining their information, PO Miller walked back to his cruiser and performed a warrant check. He received a juvenile warrant hit on one, showing that he had an outstanding juvenile warrant for a probation violation.

PO Miller walked back over to the wanted subject and his partner, who was standing with PO Elston, and PO

Miller grabbed a hold of the wanted subject's coat and informed him that he had an active warrant. He became tense, stiffened his posture, and was hesitant to walk over to PO Miller's cruiser. Lt.

Maus assisted PO Miller in escorting the wanted subject to the cruiser. Once at his cruiser, PO Miller went to perform a pat-down and the subject started to resist and pull away. He was placed in handcuffs and continued to be non-complainant. While patting him down PO Miller felt what he believed was a gun in his right front pocket. PO Miller announced to the other officers he had a gun and turned to PO Elston who was still standing with the other subject and told him to grab him. PO



**CCW/Drug Possession/Resisting Arrest**  
**(2923.12/2925.11/2921.33)**

Officers were dispatched to W. Galbraith Rd for two subjects looking into cars. Upon arrival 2 subjects were observed in the parking lot leaning against a vehicle. A vehicle parked 2 spots away from where the suspects were standing had its lights flashing.

PO Miller approached the subjects and asked if they lived in the apartment complex. They both stated no. PO Miller asked what they were doing in the parking lot and they stated they were waiting on a female to come outside; however they could not give a name of this female or tell what apartment she lived in. PO Miller asked if the car they were leaning against belonged to them, they stated no. PO Miller asked if they had

Miller reached into the suspect's pocket and pulled out a loaded Hi-Point 9mm handgun. In the same pocket was a small plastic baggie containing a white powdery substance that was later field tested positive as heroin.

PO Elston, after hearing PO Miller announce that he had a gun recovery and telling him to grab Mr. Reese, did so and performed a pat-down of his person. PO Elston also felt what he believed was a gun in the other suspect's right pants pocket. This subject was handcuffed and a loaded PW Arms 9mm handgun was pulled from his pocket.

After being Mirandized, PO Miller asked the first subject why he had the gun. He stated he was carrying it for protection. When asked about the white powdery substance, he stated that those weren't even his pants.

Both subjects were arrested and transported back to the police station for processing. Once back at the station both subjects were allowed to use their cell phones up until the time we were going to leave for the jail. The first subject could be heard stating that "they're (Police) going to have to fight me now!" He

was recording on his phone and refused to hand over his phone and be handcuffed for transport. Officers had to physical fight the phone out of his hand and fight him back into handcuffs while he attempted to video tape the police fighting him. The suspect was charged with an additional count of resisting. Both were transported to CJC.

## **Passing Bad Checks** **(2913.11)**

On 03-08-17, PO Brown was dispatched to respond to Huntington National Bank, for a report of a M/B subject in the bank, attempting to pass a bad check. Upon arrival, he went into the bank and located the subject in question at the teller counter. The teller that was assisting him confirmed that he was the subject that was called about. The teller handed him a check (#3603, drawn from the account of Grounds PRO, LLC, for \$809.24) and advised that it was not a good check. The suspect became agitated, saying that the check was sent to him in the mail and asking how could it be a bad check, because he works for the company.



The teller went to call the company listed on the check as PO Brown was talking to the subject. Moments later, the teller came back and advised she had confirmed that the subject did not and has not ever worked for the company. PO Brown placed the subject into custody and transported him back to the station. He and Officer Morris talked with the subject regarding the incident. Prior to having him write a statement and saying anything else about the matter, PO Brown read his Miranda Rights to him. He signed the Rights form and the Waiver form and advised that he would still make a statement. At first, the subject denied any involvement, but eventually began being truthful about the check. PO Brown then asked him to write a statement regarding his involvement.

The subject, advised that he received the check from another subject and that the deal was to cash the check, give this subject \$500 and he could keep the remainder. PO Brown also contacted the payroll supervisor at GroundsPRO, LLC, who again confirmed that the subject was never an employee of their company. She also confirmed that the check number that I had not been issued yet and the

format was completely wrong. She did state that the routing and account number on the check was correct and that they will have to change account numbers yet again. She advised that this type of incident has happened to them before.

## **Criminal Damaging** **(2909.06)**

Officers responded to the area of Foxwood Drive for several vehicle windows that were broken out. When Officers arrived, they could see approximately 30 people outside looking at their vehicles. Officers Six and Chaney made contact with the crowd and identified the victims. Officers Six and Chaney collected all of the victims' information needed for the report and handed out business cards. Officers advised the victims the reports would take at least 72 hours to complete and a copy could be obtained after this time period was completed. From what Officers were able to gather the last anyone saw their vehicle in good condition was approximately 2000 hrs.



## **Vehicle Tampering**

PO Shepherd was dispatched to the Oak Knoll Dr. for a report of a theft from a vehicle. Upon my arrival, she was met by the complainant, who stated an unknown person entered her vehicle overnight, but nothing was taken. She also stated that the vehicle was not damaged, but the contents of her glove box had been taken out and left on the seat.



PO Shepherd advised her that a report would be on file, and if she determined later that anything was taken, to contact the PD.

### **Assault (2903.13)**

PO Kilgore was called to UDF, 6813 Hamilton Ave. for an assault report. When he arrived, he came in contact with the victim, who stated she was assaulted after refusing service to a customer. She stated she refused to sell tobacco to a customer who did not have an ID. The customer then grabbed the \$20 bill out of her hand and in this process, the customer was hitting, scratching her hand, causing it to bleed. The assault was caught on camera but the complainant was unable to download the video. Investigation pending

### **Attempted Breaking & Entering (2911.13)**

Officers were dispatched for a general intrusion alarm at Ameristop. Upon arrival officers observed the front window with spidering cracks in the glass. A piece of concrete was seen on the ground below the window. No entry was made into the business as the window was not completely broken.

A passer-by stopped and stated that they saw a male black wearing dark clothing and a knit cap standing on the corner of the business approximately 5 minutes before PO Miller arrived on scene. A public works employee also saw the subject standing on the side of the business while out salting the street.

PO Miller attempted to contact a key holder via the alarm company but none where on file. He was able to track down a current employee through Pamet and was able to get the phone number of the owner and left him a voice mail.

### **Aggravated Robbery (2911.01)**

Officers responded to Frickers for a squad run. The dispatcher advised

the subject was bleeding heavily from the face. Officer's Elston and Wilber were first on scene. They spoke with the subject. He seemed to be intoxicated and could not tell officers why he was bleeding. The subject was bleeding heavily from his nose and behind his left ear. Squad arrived and asked the subject for his wallet. The subject was not able to locate it. A patron then said he believed the subject may have fallen in the bathroom. Officer Elston checked the bathroom and located a very large amount of blood.

As Officer Elston exited the bathroom another patron informed him, the subject had come from outside and was bleeding when he entered. This led to Officers checking outside. Officers Elston and Wilber then located a large amount of blood in and next to the victim's vehicle. Officer Wilber updated dispatch and advised the call was now a robbery. The victim was asked if he was robbed and still was unable to provide additional information. The victim stated he could not remember past walking out of the door. Officer Elston asked to see any video.

While watching the video Officers finally located the victim leaving

Frickers. Officers were able to see the call was approximately 45 min old. For this reason, a K9 was not called. Prior to the victim exiting, a person of interest walks in to use the ATM. The subject comes in from the right and inserts his card. This takes place at approximately 2031 hours. As the victim comes into the camera view (approximately 30 seconds later), the subject "whips his head toward the victim." The victim appears to be stuffing something into his wallet. The victim stated he had just paid with

cash. He went on to say he had approximately \$350 in cash on his person. The suspect then watches the victim leave and follows directly after him. The suspect continues in the same path of the victim, now to the left. It is unknown if this subject is

involved at this time. Officer Wilber called the ATM Company and left a message to contact police, as it may contain a camera as well. Officers Six, Wilber and Elston searched the area from 5/3 bank to NCH Car wash in attempt for additional evidence or the victim's property. Officers were not able to locate anything related to this crime.



## **Aggravated Menacing** **(2903.21)**

PO Shepherd responded to Gloria Dr. for a report of a female with a gun, threatening a male at the residence. Upon arrival, officers entered the residence and made contact with the female, who stated she had a gun in her backpack in a bedroom of the residence. The female was detained by P.O. Shepherd and P.O. Henn. A .357 caliber Ruger SP101 handgun was recovered by P.O. Palmisano from the backpack. Upon speaking with the suspect, she stated she got into a verbal altercation with her brother in-law, however denied displaying the handgun during the argument.



During this time, P.O. Brown was speaking with the complainant, who stated he and the suspect were in a verbal altercation, but during the argument Wilson pulled out her handgun, pointed it at him, and stated she was going to kill him. He then stated he did wish to press charges and the suspect was taken into custody.

The suspect was charged with Aggravated Menacing and transported to the Hamilton County Justice Center.
